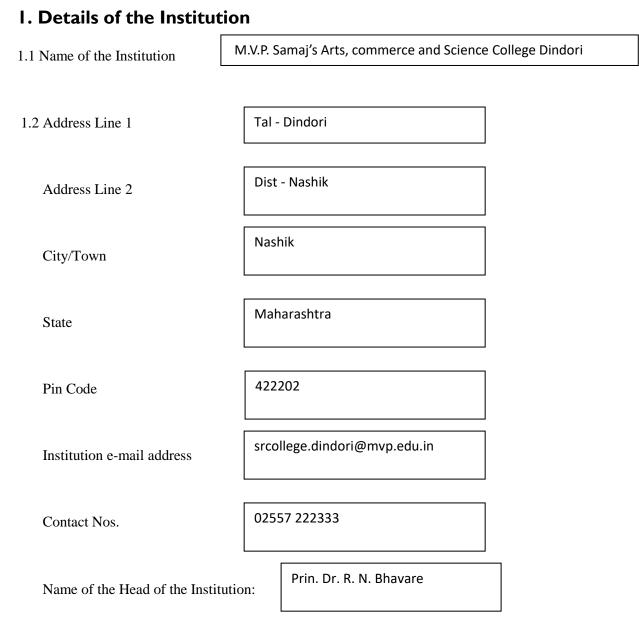



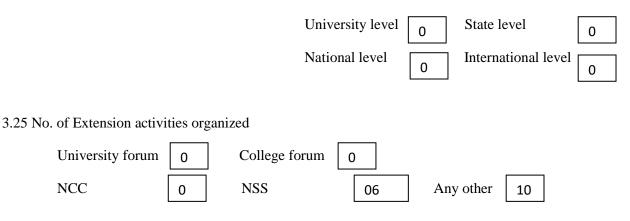

Title- Vermicompost- west management

Context-

Vermicompost helps us in two ways i.e. in terms of (1)Replacement of harmful chemical fertilizers which play hazards with the soil fertility and human health together, and (2) removal of garbage and solid waste of the cities/villages in a fast highly effective way. It is the product from the action of the intestinal microfloras of the worms which digests and modify the useless organic waste into usable fertilizer mass. Tropical soils are comparatively deficient in plant nutrients, and we waste large amounts of these nutrients locked in domestic and agriculture wastes

Objective

- It helps to create awareness among the student having agricultural background and also help to control envinmental pollution and develops ecofriendly practices among students.
- Large volume of organic matter generated from agricultural activities, and animal shelters
 usually dumped in corners creates foul smell, can be utilized by properly composting it
 into a value-added end product
- The chief objective is to compost organic wastes not for the disposal of solid organic wastes but also to produce superior quality manure to feed our "nutrient/organic matter hungry" soils.
- Large volume of organic matter generated from agricultural activities, dairy farms and animal shelters usually dumped in corners emanating foul smell, can be utilized by properly composting it into a value-added end product

Practice-

The departments of zoology have maintained a vermiculture project. Through this project organic waste from college area is converted into vermicompost. Earthworms have over 600 million years of experience as waste managers in the global ecosystem. Vermi-composting is self-promoted, self-regulated, self improved & self-enhanced, low or no-energy requiring zero-waste technology, easy to construct, operate and maintain. Earthworms degrade and compost all organic wastes Vermicompost is the excreta of earthworm, which is rich in humus. Vermicompost contains water-soluble nutrients and is an excellent, nutrient-rich organic fertilizer and soil conditioner. Commercially available fertilizers also tend to be damaging and can burn fragile plants, unlike the compost produced by vermiculture. Since worm castings will never burn the delicate roots of a plant, many growers opt to plant their plants directly into nutrient-rich worm castings. The worm castings also contain beneficial microbes that help protect plants from a variety of diseases. Unlike chemical fertilizers, compost produced in vermiculture has no undesirable smells. It normally only smells like rich soil. Worm casting compost is generally used not only during a plant's vegetative stage but also during its flowering phase.

Obstacles of the practice

- One of the primary Vermicomposting Disadvantages is the Cowdung. Since it is the bed for an earthworm to breed. Hence cow dung should be free of weed seeds and pathogens that affect earthworm.
- You have to do this process of vermicompost in a proper shed. Since there is a risk
 of crows feeding on the earthworms.
- Other predators like rat, pig, and termites also affect the earthworm population in the compost bed.
- One has to maintain adequate moisture level. Otherwise, it creates water stress that earthworms could not tolerate and difficult for them to survive.
- The compost beds should be free of plastics, glass pieces and stones that may hurt the earthworms.
- If the compost bed is like a heap, then it increases the temperature and earthworm find difficult to survive.
- Traditional method of harvesting vermicompost is time-consuming process than modern method
 - the initial investment is high.

Impact of the practice

- Organic wastes can be broken down and fragmented rapidly by earthworms, resulting in a stable nontoxic material with good structure, which has a potentially high economic value and also act as soil conditioner for plant growth.
- Vermicompost supplies a suitable mineral balance, improves nutrient availability and could act as complex-fertilizer granules.
- Vermicomposting involves great reduction in populations of pathogenic microorganisms, thus not differing from composting from this point of view.
- Vermicomposting also leads to decrease the environmental problems arising from their disposal, without needing in many cases to complete the process.

- It should be realized that vermicomposting can be a useful cottage industry for the underprivileged and the economically weak as it can provide them with a supplementary income.
- If every village can formulate a cooperative society of unemployed youth/women group, it could be a wise venture for them to produce vermicompost and sell it back to the village at a recommended price. The youth will not only earn money, but also aid society by providing excellent quality organic manure for sustainable agro-practices.
